A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

My name is David Coppinger and I was elected as Chairman of Bray Parish Council in May this year. I have lived in Holyport since 1995 and have been a Councillor for 6 years. I have a specific interest in reducing traffic speeds and reducing the number of heavy vehicle movements. The work of the Parish Council involves both its day to day running and also driving longer term projects. This year we have set up a specific working group to examine the strategic direction of the Council over the 4 year period of our office. The Council has now adopted these propos-



als and we will be developing objectives and action plans over the next few months. The specific strategies are:-

Communications

We intend improving communications in both directions with residents, suppliers and the Royal Borough.

Local Plan

We will investigate the opportunities to drive a local plan within one of the Wards. This plan will set out the specific requirements of that Ward and become a blueprint for the future. To be a success this plan must be written by the residents not the Parish Council.

Local Design Statement

Within the Parish we have a number of specific planning issues e.g the haphazard development along the A308. We believe that this Statement, if adopted by the Borough, could enable us to manage this situation which we cannot at the moment.

Relationship with the Royal Borough

We will improve the relationship between the Parish and the Royal Borough to ensure that we are aligned to better meet the needs of residents.

I look forward to updating you on our progress over the coming months.

WE NEED YOUR HELP TO PROTECT THE A308!

A number of sites along the A308 Windsor Road have received or are in the process of applying for planning permission to build new housing. These include the old Mazda site, 190 and land at the rear of 248–260 Windsor Road. All of these sites have densities of, or close to, 32 dwellings per hectare, far denser than any existing housing in the area. These developments are having a very significant negative effect on the environment for local residents, on the traffic along the A308 and, in the opinion of the Parish Council, is changing the area for the worse.

The Parish Council is examining the potential for creating a Village Design Statement as a framework which, when adopted by the Royal Borough of Windsor & Maidenhead as a Supplementary Planning Document (SPD), can be used by Planning Officers as additional guidance on the type of developments that are acceptable within the area covered by the

Village Design Statement.

The Parish Council is planning to arrange for presentations on what it means to create a Village Design Statement from Planning Aid and from The Community Council for Berkshire. These presentations will be at the start of scheduled Council meetings and will be open to members of the public. Look out for notices of these sessions on our noticeboards and website.

The key to a successful Village Design Statement is the involvement and leadership, managed and delivered by Residents. This means that we need Residents to come forward and be prepared to be an active part of this critical project to protect the environment of the Parish of Bray. NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Neighbourhood Watch now has its own official website. Every week, I send out Community Messages to over 2.000 people already on the database by telephone, fax or email, I circulate details of all the burglaries, car crime (usually Sat Nay's) and laptops (when, where and what was stolen). Plus a lot of crime prevention advice, on how not to be a victim of current crimes. Every single resident in the Royal Borough can now register to receive these informative messages. It doesn't matter whether or not you are in a Neighbourhood Watch scheme. The Police want this information and prevention advice to be circulated as widely as possible. Simply go online at www.tvpcommunitymessage.org and register.

Once you receive messages, you will see how important it is, to phone the police with reports of all suspicious people and cars that circulate in your local community. It's the jigsaw puzzle principle. If you feel something is supicious - it usually is! Anyone going door to door selling anything, should be reported to the police on the 0845 8 505 505 number if they alert your suspicions. Roofers, tarmaccers, double glazing salesmen, Nottingham Knockers (young lads selling household products door to door) etc should all be reported as soon as possible, so that the police can come out and have a word with them and remember the Neighbourhood watch motto: WE DO NOT BUY GOODS AND SERVICES AT THE DOOR!

The policing of Fifield, is being transferred from Windsor Police Station to Maidenhead to be included in PC Pete Johns Beat of Bray/Holyport. Neighbourhood Watch is no longer a bunch of nosey neighbours, but a well informed source of information and liaison with the Not willing to talk to the Police? police, RBWM and local people. Displaying both street signs and door signs, does deter opportunist thieves. Through the messaging system, you will hear about all their methods they use, why and how they chose target houses, cars and most particularly how not to be a victim. The first priority it to make sure you are not inviting crime! Join us and become aware.

- To be ready and equipped to deal with major crime and critical incidents.

NEW YOUTH SHELTER IN GAYS LANE FIELD

The Parish was fortunate enough to be offered free a shelter to be used as a young people's focal point. Early indications are that this facility has been welcomed by the young people of the area and that it is being used regularly.
